Profile: Enma When Enma was a girl, her family lived deep in the full tropics near Valladolid, on the Eastern slope of the Andes in S. Ecuador. They hiked "four mountain ridges" to get to the challenging river crossing that provided access to neighbors. They bartered the corn, beans, fruits and medicines they grew in exchange for the few gardening tools & pots for cooking that they needed, apart from what the jungle provided. When illnesses such as malaria, dengue, measles threatened, Enma's mother and grandmother were relied upon for herbal medicine knowledge, as Enma is in modern-day Vilcabamba.



Organic Cooridors

Our neighborhood, Jurupe in San Jose de Vilcabamba appears to be the first that has identified ourselves as an organic cooridor.

We are 6 contiguous properties (Mary O'Donnell & Raul Baez, Will Tuttle, Zia & Roshni, Suzannah & Filipe, Brian, Enma Cordero) with approximately 12 hectares.

We have plans for promoting awareness of who are your neighbors, and what are they doing to the land & water? Our aim is to create an online mapping process, to make it desireable to live in an
